Els for Elephant Draw the outline of a large elephant on paper. Write these letters below it: *e, m, s, t, p, n, f, b, g, r, d,* and *j*. Take turns with your child writing words on the elephant outline that have the short *e* sound you hear in the words *egg* and *elephant*. Write and read as many three-letter words as you can!

CHALLENGS

Together, create little rhymes using some of the three-letter words, such as "Have you *met* my new little *pet*?"



Growing a Garden Say the rhyme "Mary, Mary, Quite Contrary" with your child: *Mary, Mary, quite contrary,/How does your garden grow?/* With silver bells and cockleshells,/And pretty maids all in a row. Have your child draw a picture to go with the rhyme. Then work together to write a sentence about Mary, using the words she and all.




Fantastic Flowers Sunflowers get their name because they look like the sun. With your child, think of some silly names for flowers, such as duckflower, bananaflower, cookieflower, or balloonflower. Together, draw funny pictures of the flowers and label them.



Harvest Time Read the story below to your child. Talk together about what happens first, next, and last in the story.
